Spotting A Phony Set Of Ray-Ban Eyewear

Ray Ban has long been producing sunglasses for over 80 years, and as probably the most well-known brand names available on the market, they are often on the costly side. When shopping for Ray-Bans, you'll want to make certain you get what you buy. Quite a few knock-off suppliers make replications, plus fraudulent sellers occasionally try and pass them off upon trusting buyers. In case you are in the market for a new pair of Ray-Bans, make sure you know precisely what to take into consideration to make sure you don't end up with a pair of [counterfeit Ray Ban](#).

Glance at the box your Ray Ban arrived in. There must be a recycling logo, and a semi-permanent sticker label on the box, as well as a serial number, manufacturer and distributor specifics, lens and also frame type, as well as the model number of the particular style of sunglasses. If this type of label is missing, any sunglasses within the box are usually not authentic.

Look at the case that they arrived in. There ought to be the gold logo engraved, not painted, upon the case which says "Luxottica." In the event the logo is painted or missing, the chances are the sunglasses in your case really are a fake.

Hold the sunglasses and verify the actual engraved Ray Ban logo, that is an interlocking RB, underneath the bridge of the nose-piece. Whenever holding the sunglasses upside down, this engraving should read right-side up. If it's the other way up, maybe you have a set of fakes.

Check the right lens for the RB symbols. If it is over the hinge, your Ray-Bans are real. In the event the engraving appears under the actual hinge, they are probably fake.

Examine the rubber quality on the earpieces and frame. Good quality rubber is put to use on real [Ray Bans](#) and will feel chalky to touch, not necessarily tacky, inflexible or slippery.

Examine the grade of the authenticity card that accompany the glasses. Not only must it be published upon top-quality cardstock, it needs to be totally free of grammatical mistakes and typing errors. The printer ink must not smudge or smear, which you may test by running your digit on the printed card. Stick to this particular guide and you will be capable of [spotting fakes](#).
